

Position Title: DARE Academic-in-Residence

Status: 12-month unsalaried honorary appointment. The terms

of the appointment will vary depending on the academic, who may be from any discipline, but is ideally for one

complete academic year.

Accountable to: DARE Partnership Project Team which comprises of

representatives from the University of Leeds and Opera

North.

For 15 years DARE has been the flagship partnership between the University of Leeds and Opera North, making a joint contribution to learning and practice in the cultural sector.

Over the years, DARE has worked with a number of academics who have been granted honorary status as DARE Academics-in-Residence. Each has been involved in working alongside Opera North to undertake original research into aspects of the company's work, create new material and deliver academic and/or public-facing events.

Main Purpose of the Role

The aim of the residency is to provide opportunities for an academic from <u>any</u> academic field working at the University of Leeds to explore their area of practice-based research alongside the operations of Opera North, one of the UK's five national opera companies.

The DARE Academic-in-Residence will have access to staff, performers, rehearsals and performances as well as desk space at the Howard Opera Centre to explore their work on a part-time basis alongside their usual academic role. During the residency there may also be opportunities to connect with Opera North audiences and partners in the academic, cultural and community sectors.

To guide the role-holder in understanding the working structures, practices and culture of Opera North, support will be provided by a dedicated senior staff member throughout the residency to act as an ally/facilitator. The role-holder will also benefit from regular liaison and engagement with senior staff at the University of Leeds.

In addition, the DARE Academic-in-Residence will be supported to:

 give talks or engage with the wider university community, public and other audiences about their work.

The DARE Academic-in-Residence will be required to:

- participate in the evaluation of the residency
- provide documentation on the residency experience for use in reports,
 publications and presentations, and on the DARE/Opera North/University of Leeds website
- positively represent the DARE partnership.

Funding of £1000 is available to support research activity, subject to prior approval.

Past DARE Academics-in-Residence have included:

Most recently, Prof. Edward Venn, Professor of Music at the University of Leeds, whose specialities include opera studies, music theory and music analysis has spent a year working alongside the company to bring together diverse voices from all areas of the performing arts and academia for a series of discussions and events questioning how (and which) audiences listen, of who has the right to tell certain stories, and how organisations facilitate or inhibit authentic creative voices. Professor Venn's residency also included the facilitation of an exhibition displayed at the University of Leeds focusing on race, ethics and representation in operatic storytelling.

Prof. Karen Burland-Clark, a University of Leeds Professor of Applied Music Psychology, who undertook an ethnographic study of Opera North: Artistry, community, identity. Her research involved observing the development of various rehearsals and performances and consulting with Opera North performers to better understand the nature and impact of a professional career in music.

Edmund Gordon, writer of the critically acclaimed biography of Angela Carter and Senior Lecturer in Creative Writing at King's College London, spent time with practitioners and students during Opera North's 2017 Fairy Tales season. He found the DARE programme to be "a hugely valuable initiative allowing academics to peer outside their discipline, gain first-hand insights into a vibrant artistic community, and present their research to fresh audiences."

Philip Kitcher, a John Dewey Professor of Philosophy at Columbia University, who became immersed in the creative process for Opera North's Ring cycle in 2016. He engaged with the creative team, wrote for the programme and lectured at the University of Leeds.
